All Ministries flow from Baptism

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

—From The Letter the Romans Chapter 6 verses 3 and 4

Entering our worship space lately it would be difficult to miss some movement of the furniture. It's inescapable even. We have moved the font, a change; both outward and visible. It is a stunningly beautiful font where many of the people of St. Paul's began their journey of faith. I also assure you this action was taken in a thoughtful, prayerful way with theological reasoning, not for aesthetics.


First, baptism is the beginning of everything. Our prayer book describes baptism as the "full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ Body, the Church" and "the bond, which establishes in Baptism, is indissoluble." (BCP 298)

For so many generations of the church, the placement of the font was based on previous prayer books. There was a time where baptisms were private affairs; reserved only for families. The baptismal rite was a separate liturgy and not woven into a part of the Eucharist.

But the baptismal rite in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer changed all of that. The emphasis of baptism, as Professor of Divinity at Sewanee Reverend James F. Turrell says, "is less on washing from sin and into more about the entry into discipleship, and an assertion that baptism is full initiation."

Everything begins at baptism. This is our rite of passage; the beginning of our journey of faith. Eucharist begins at baptism. Every time we participate in the eucharist, we renew our baptism. We baptize marriage. We baptize ordination. And yes, baptism does get in the way of our own death... thanks be to God.

In this way, baptism is anything but private.
When we promise to "continue in the apostles' teaching



and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers," or "seek to serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves," or "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being," how can we make such radical promises in solitude? Baptism, a life of discipleship, cannot be lived out in isolation and it certainly cannot be done within the walls of a building.

And so, our font is now centrally located. It is restored near the entrance with enough space for us to gather and witness. Our font gets in the way because well, baptism gets in the way. It gets in the way of everything we do and everything we are as a people of God. We are the church, the continuing mission of Christ's grace-giving presence in the world. As St. Augustine says in Baptism "we say yes to who we are and what we become."
